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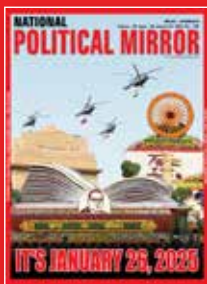

Now, ladies and gentlemen, it's time to talk about the February 9 cover page and its concept, as well as the cover story and its headline.

So, my respected citizens, the most recent cover page of National Political Mirror, the only weekly political magazine in the world, says that the new government in Delhi, led by the BJP, will fix the problems that the previous government left behind over the last 11 years.

And I say this simply because, in the recently finished 2025 Delhi Assembly Elections, the BJP won after 27 years, and not only that, but the BJP scored a historic triumph because voters believed in the party and its promises. And the results of the 2025 Delhi Assembly elections were announced on February 8, 2025, capturing power in the national capital after nearly three decades and unseating the ruling Aam Aadmi Party (AAP).

While the BJP won 48 seats in the 70-member legislative assembly, the AAP earned only 22 seats, down from 62 in the 2020 elections. Meanwhile, Congress faced another defeat, finishing without any seats for the third consecutive time.

On the other side, I don't know who and what they are stating about the recently finished 2025 Delhi Assembly polls and their results.

However, I am expressing and sharing my thoughts through my editorial in this issue based on what I have learnt about politics since 1996. By the way, I have been eating

politics for breakfast, lunch, snacks, and dinner since 1996.

I would like to explain why Arvind Kejriwal lost his own New Delhi Assembly seat, which was previously held by the late Congress leader and former chief minister of Delhi, Sheila Dikshit, from 1998 to 2023.

Prior to Sheila Dikshit, the New Delhi assembly constituency was held by Kirti Azad, a former BJP leader and current TMC Lok Sabha MP, during the 1993 Delhi Assembly Polls.

So, the New Delhi Assembly constituency was originally held by the BJP, and the party won it again. Previously, the New Delhi Assembly constituency was known as the Gole Market constituency. The New Delhi Assembly Constituency is part of the New Delhi Lok Sabha constituency. In 2008, the delimitation commission reorganised and formed this constituency.

To keep talking about Arvind Kejriwal and the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), I believe Arvind Kejriwal knew that the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) would lose the 2025 Delhi Assembly elections despite delivering welfare plans to Delhi residents, often known as freebie schemes. However, in December 2024, he resigned and allowed his party leader, Atishi, to become the chief minister. I have already mentioned the reason for Arvind Kejriwal's resignation in the previous paragraph. As Arvind Kejriwal was aware of the ground reality, that's why in December 2024, the Arvind Kejriwal-led Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) joined hands with Prashant Kishore's political consultancy firm, the Indian Political Action Committee (I-PAC), to enhance campaign strategies and outreach ahead of the 2025 Delhi Assembly elections. But the partnership failed, as the Aam Aadmi Party's performance was much poorer than in the 2013, 2015, and 2020 assembly polls.

Additionally, I was aware that the Aam Aadmi Party would lose the 2025 Assembly polls based on my daily conversations with Delhi voters. In fact, I tweeted on December 7, 2024, stating that, trust me, neither IPac, Tea Pack, nor Data Pack will prevent the BJP from increasing its seats in the Delhi

Assembly Elections. At the same time, in tweets on December 5, 2024, I stated that neither IPac, Tea Pack, nor Data Pack will prevent Congress from opening accounts for the 2025 Delhi Assembly elections.

I was confident that Congress would open its accounts for the 2025 Delhi Assembly polls, but the party did not. Therefore, I apologise for my tweets in which I stated that neither IPac, Tea Pack, nor Data Pack would prevent Congress from establishing its presence in the upcoming elections. Therefore, I apologise for tweets stating that neither IPac, Tea Pack, nor Data Pack would prevent Congress from opening its accounts.

However, if Arvind Kejriwal had not resigned as chief minister after being released from Tihar Jail on bail in connection with the alleged liquor policy scam in 2024, he could have saved his own assembly seat, and the Aam Aadmi Party could have retained power, but not with the results achieved by the party in the 2015 and 2020 Delhi Assembly elections.

I believed that the BJP wanted Arvind Kejriwal to resign as chief minister, and he did just that when he stepped down without a second thought. The BJP was on the lookout for prime opportunities, and it found one following the CAG reports on the "Sheesh Mahal," the official residence of the Delhi chief minister, and they simply took them. And those golden opportunities helped the BJP win the recently concluded 2025 Delhi Assembly elections with great political strategies.

I also believed that the BJP's effective political strategies were centred around the "Sheesh Mahal," the official residence of the Delhi chief minister, where Arvind Kejriwal resided from 2015 until October 2024. whereas AAP's decreased to 43.5 per cent. The BJP's vote share increased from more than 32% in 2015 to 38.5 per cent in 2020, compared to the AAP's over 54% and 53.5 per cent, respectively.

Meanwhile, Congress, which has not secured a single seat for the third consecutive time in Delhi, experienced a slight increase in its vote share, garnering 6.34 per cent of the votes. However, I have included all details in the following pages of this edition.

Let us talk about those individuals and politicians who never went to collect ground reports but are now lecturing that the Congress and AAP should have contested the recently finished 2025 Delhi Assembly elections jointly. However, I would like to advise them that if they are unaware of ground reports in politics and the sentiments of voters, they should avoid writing and speaking about politics.

However, its vote share has increased from 4.26 percent in 2020 to 6.34 percent in 2025 due to strong political strategies during the polls, and this was made possible because the BJP and Congress did not counter each other during the elections, except for a few occasions. And, I also believe that Congress can perform better in upcoming polls by increasing its vote share in the recently concluded 2025 Delhi Assembly Polls.

I believe it was effective political strategies from both Congress and BJP, as I think both parties had a singular motive: to defeat Arvind Kejriwal and his party, the Aam Aadmi Party, in the 2025 Delhi elections. Assembly polls showed that both parties experienced success thanks to their robust political strategies.

However, in the recently concluded 2025 Delhi Assembly polls, the BJP won resoundingly when Congress played a key role

in defeating Arvind Kejriwal and many sitting Aam Aadmi Party MLAs, including party leaders.

Additionally, I have detailed everything regarding the winners, as well as those who placed second and third in the polls, along with the number of votes received by candidates in the 2025 Delhi Assembly Polls in the following pages of the magazine.

On the other hand, if you watch 25 January's BJP's second most powerful leader and India's Home Minister Amit Shah's press conference video on BJP's official YouTube channel, all readers may understand BJP and Congress' strong political strategy.

In the meantime, a party that wins at least 36 out of 70 assembly seats has the constitutional right to form the government of Delhi. So, recent poll results have determined that the BJP will rule Delhi for the next five years, and I expect the BJP to keep the promises made in its manifesto and during political

rallies by its top leaders.

BJP always Active

In the 2020 Delhi Assembly Polls, the BJP secured eight assembly seats, yet its eight MLAs behaved as if there were more than 28 MLAs. All eight MLAs were consistently active both inside and outside the assembly. Whenever sessions were held in the Delhi Assembly and in the houses, these MLAs played a strong role as the opposition party members.

In fact, BJP MLAs have been thrown out of the assembly numerous times, but on September 20, 2022, all BJP MLAs were forcibly thrown out by marshals on the order of deputy speaker Rakhi Birla after BJP MLA Mohan Singh Bisht protested against holding a debate on the issue of letters written for the posting of DTC drivers, claiming that a resolution needed to be brought for the debate. But Birla stated that

there was House consensus for the debate, and she can allow it under Rule 293. As the BJP MLAs continued to protest the debate, the deputy speaker directed marshals to remove all BJP MLAs from the House for disrupting proceedings

and disobeying her orders.

However, I believe that all eight BJP MLAs were acting in accordance with what strong opposition members should do. The BJP MLAs were protesting against the Delhi government

to ensure that the demands of opposition members were acknowledged in the assembly. This was a sign of strong opposition in the Delhi Assembly, which is always necessary in a democracy.

Despite being forcibly removed by marshals from the assembly for protesting against Arvind Kejriwal government in recent years, BJP MLAs have been seen asking questions to the Kejriwal government about issues affecting Delhi residents and raising them through the Delhi Assembly speaker. Also, believe that Delhi BJP MLAs followed great political suggestions from top BJP leaders, and that their suggestions worked as the BJP won Delhi with a resounding victory.

At the same time, I still find myself in the dark regarding the hidden political strategies of the BJP's top leaders, particularly concerning the tactics employed in the 2025 Delhi Assembly elections

that led to their resounding victory.

To my knowledge, none of the BJP leaders have disclosed their party's strategies to journalists during press conferences or interviews with news anchors or political journalists. However, I possess the ability to grasp the nuances of the BJP's approach, or that of any political party, fuelled by my passion for politics.

So I pay close attention to the eyes, eyebrows, cheeks, lips, and forehead of politicians during press conferences, which allows me to gain insights beyond their spoken words. I have composed several paragraphs detailing how the BJP executed its effective political strategies to achieve a resounding victory in the Delhi polls.

In fact, if readers take the time to watch old news and videos from YouTube since 2020, they might gain some insight into the political strategies of BJP and its leaders' political strategies, as well as how

they worked every day to counter the Arvind Kejriwal-led Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) government and its leaders.

There is nothing wrong with seeking answers from the government with a proper strategy as the opposition party in policy matters. In a democracy, the primary role of the opposition is to ask questions and seek answers from the government related to the people.

Since I believe that if I were the leader of the opposition and the leader of a national political party, I would have followed the same political strategy that the BJP used as the constructive opposition party in the Delhi Assembly House and on the other side of the assembly to meet Delhi residents' expectations, which I believe was an excellent political strategy. And I believe that when a political party is in opposition, they should act in the same way that the BJP has

since 2020 in the Delhi Assembly and outside of it.

During the Delhi Assembly polls, if I were leading a political party and my party was contesting the elections, I would have implemented strategies similar to those of the BJP, which achieved a resounding victory in the Delhi Assembly Polls.

This approach helped the party secure 48 assembly seats with a 45.56% vote share, especially considering that the BJP won only eight assembly seats in the 2020 Delhi assembly elections with a 38.51% vote share.

At the same time, the Aam Aadmi Party, which had been in power in Delhi since 2013, secured only 22 assembly seats with a vote share of 43:57. However, in the 2020 Delhi Assembly polls, the Aam Aadmi Party achieved a significant victory, winning 62 assembly seats with a vote share of 53:57.

In the 2015 Delhi Legislative Assembly election, the Aam Aadmi Party achieved an absolute majority, winning 67 out of 70 seats with a 54.3% vote share. The BJP secured three seats with a 32.3% vote share, while in the 2013 Assembly polls, they had won 32 seats with over 33% vote share.

On the other hand, Congress Party did not win any seats, despite winning eight seats in the 2013 Delhi Assembly elections with 24.6% of the vote.

In the 2013 Delhi assembly elections, the BJP won 32 assembly seats, and forming a government in any political party requires 36 seats, so the party needed four more seats to form the government. So I believe the numbers were not with the BJP, which is why the party refused to form a government.

So, in its first election, the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) won 28 assembly seats and formed the

government, with its leader, Arvind Kejriwal, becoming chief minister with external support from the Congress party, which won eight assembly seats in the 2013 polls.

The BJP achieved victory after 27 years, thanks to outstanding political strategies. I am knowledgeable about these strategies, even though no BJP leaders have shared their plans for the 2025 Delhi Assembly polls with me or anyone else.

I am aware of this because, I have had a strong interest in politics since 1996, as if I were leading a national political party. If my party were sitting on the opposition bench in the assembly, I would implement similar strategies to those of the BJP. I would go beyond the BJP and its leaders' strategies, and here is nothing wrong with doing politics with excellent strategies to win elections and meet residents' expectations.

And believe me, top BJP leaders won my heart because the BJP strategically introduced unhappy AAP leaders and sitting MLAs in front of the media at the right time through press conferences. They were granted membership in the BJP and subsequently contested the Delhi Assembly elections, successfully winning their respective assembly seats.

Believe me, when eight sitting MLAs joined the BJP during the elections, it was a masterstroke from the top leaders in terms of strategy. However, I didn't write about it, even though I knew that the discontented AAP MLAs joining would have benefited the BJP in the polls. As a journalist, I have always believed that I should not write anything that might confuse voters during election time.

Trust me, many AAP leaders and MLAs joined the BJP during the polls, which significantly aided the BJP in the recently concluded

Delhi Assembly elections. And believe this is called brilliant political strategy from BJP in 2025's first and most difficult polls, which was won by BJP with a great victory.

As any experienced batsman knows which balls to play and which to skip in a test match, top BJP leaders did the same during

the polls, holding two to three press conferences per day to inform Delhi citizens about how taxpayers' money was spent by then-Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal on the controversial 'Sheesh Mahal' bungalow, 6, Flagstaff Road bungalow served as Arvind Kejriwal's official residence as Delhi Chief Minister from 2015

until October 2024.

The BJP's primary political campaign for the 2025 Delhi Assembly was centred around the 'Sheesh Mahal' bungalow, which became a significant talking point in every household across Delhi. This strategy helped the BJP connect with Delhi voters, resulting in the party winning 48 assembly seats in the Delhi Assembly.

Following the controversial 'Sheesh Mahal' bungalow, the BJP's second political campaign focused on the liquor scam and other key issues such as corruption, poor roads, irregular water supply, air pollution, and non-functioning mohalla clinics.

Following the strategies, the BJP reached the grassroots of Delhi through a focused campaign featuring leaders from across the country, including chief ministers, union ministers, and NDA constituents.

And, believe me, since I had attended all BJP and Congress press conferences, BJP leaders have successfully convinced

Delhi residents that the renovation cost of the controversial 'Sheesh Mahal' bungalow, which was Arvind Kejriwal's official residence as Delhi chief minister, ranged between Rs 75 and Rs 80 crore.

During the polls' press conference, the BJP also claimed that Aam Aadmi Party chief Arvind Kejriwal misused public funds between Rs 75 crore to 80 crore to renovate his official residence.

Moving further, the world's largest political party said that Arvind Kejriwal did not obtain approval from Delhi Lieutenant Governor VK Saxena's office for more than Rs 10 crore in tenders for the renovations of the controversial 'Sheesh Mahal' bungalow.

To avoid clearance from Delhi Lieutenant Governor (L-G) VK Saxena, divide the total amount of tenders for reconstructing the Delhi Chief Minister's residence into smaller amounts of less than Rs 10 crore for each tender.

The preliminary expenditure for the construction of the Chief

Minister's residence in Delhi was estimated to be between Rs 15 crore and Rs 20 crore. Nonetheless, the figure was occasionally exaggerated, resulting in a total expenditure of Rs 52,71,24,570 (around Rs 53 crore). To avoid getting approval from the Principal Secretary of the PWD, who has the authority to grant

financial sanctions exceeding Rs 10 crore, split sanctions of less than Rs 10 crore were obtained in a complicated manner on each occasion.

During the polls, BJP Delhi President Virendra Sachdeva claimed that the 2022 CAG report recorded an expenditure of Rs 33.86 crore on the residence

known as the "Sheesh Mahal." He, however, asserted that the true cost was considerably greater. He, however, claimed the actual cost was significantly higher.

"This report pertains to expenditure till 2022. There is no revelation on expenses of 2023 and 2024, and according to our information, the real cost runs up to Rs 75-80 crore if the inventory of the items in the bungalow is included," Sachdeva had said.

The residence, dubbed "Sheesh Mahal" by the BJP, had become a lightning rod for accusations and counter-accusations, with BJP leaders, including Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Home Minister Amit Shah, made it a key issue in their campaign for the recently concluded 2025 Delhi Assembly Polls against the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) and Arvind Kejriwal.

However, the media did not cover everything about BJP press conferences, but BJP messages were delivered to Delhi citizens via other platforms such as BJP official social media accounts Twitter, Facebook, LinkedIn, YouTube, and BJP leaders. I have

seen people in Delhi gossiping about Arvind Kejriwal's 'Sheesh Mahal' bungalow, AAP and its leaders about the liquor policy scam, despite the fact that many were benefiting from the AAP government.

So, change is always beneficial to voters in democracy, and it should occur at least once every ten years if voters do not remove the ruling political party after five-year terms completed by polls, as voters want to give another five-year term to the political party in power because voters may believe that five years is insufficient for the

ruling political party to meet voter expectations.

Strategies to defeat the top three.

Before going ahead, I would like to share my thoughts on Delhi politics over the last couple of months and the upcoming 2025 Delhi Assembly Polls. The BJP was thousands of steps ahead of the AAP and Congress regarding ground strategy in the Delhi Assembly elections, which helped the BJP achieve a resounding victory in the recently concluded Delhi Assembly Polls.

The Congress, on the other hand, was ahead of both the BJP and the AAP when it comes to media strategy, such as having press conferences and answering questions from reporters.

Even I knew that whoever was asking me who is going to win the Delhi Assembly, I was telling them the BJP will definitely form the government and also told them that the top three Aam Aadmi

Party candidates are losing their respective assembly seats, as I was fully convinced of the BJP's political strategy for the 2025 Delhi Assembly polls. However, I was not convinced about Congress's party ground political strategy.

In fact, I tweeted on December 5, 2024, that the BJP would definitely increase its assembly seats in the 2025 Delhi Assembly polls, and that the Aam Aadmi Party's condition would differ from 2020, 2015, and 2013.

I also mentioned in my tweet that simultaneously, the Congress party would be opening its accounts for the 2025 Delhi Assembly polls, but the party has failed. Therefore, I apologise to all citizens for what I wrote about the Congress party.

At the same time, I am very impressed with both national political parties—BJP and Congress—for their strategies to defeat the top three leaders of the Aam Aadmi Party, as both the BJP and Congress's sole motto was to defeat the top three leaders of the Aam Aadmi Party, and both parties succeeded in their mission,

Chief Minister Atishi, who won the Kalkaji constituency by a margin of 3,500 votes. She won because Congress's Alka Lamba did not campaign properly, and she also had a lack of coordination with her party cadres despite having full support from her party and top leadership, and she only received 4,392 votes from the Kalkaji constituency.

I already mentioned in the previous paragraph that Aam Aadmi Party's candidate Atishi was expected to lose her assembly seat, and earlier in the trends on the morning of February 8, 2025, Atishi was falling behind. Later in the day, Atishi emerged victorious from the Kalkaji constituency in Delhi, defeating her main rival, BJP leader Ramesh Bidhuri, in a closely contested race. Election Commission of India records show that Atishi, a top AAP leader, won

Revisit the Delhi Assembly elections

It is true that the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has returned to power in the country's capital Delhi after 27 years, defeating Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal and his Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), which is a big blow for Kejriwal, who has been a vocal opponent of Narendra Modi and Amit Shah.

However, the BJP got 48 of the 70 seats in the Delhi assembly. It dropped from 63 seats won by the AAP in 2020 to 22 seats won by the party.

It is worth noting that the last BJP chief minister of Delhi was almost 27 years ago. In those days, the capital had to go through three different Chief Ministers in the five years from 1993 to 1998. In the 1993 assembly elections, the BJP won 49 of the 70 assembly seats, while the Congress won 14, the Janata Dal won four, and the remaining three went to Independents.

As the s 'Delhi ka Sher' or "Lion of Delhi," Madan Lal Khurana was the first chief minister of Delhi for the Bharatiya Janata Party in 1993, after the 69th Amendment to the Constitution made Delhi's assembly elected again.

Before the year 1993

The first Delhi Assembly elections were held since the 1952 elections. The poll was held on March 27, 1952, with India's first Lok Sabha election, and 48 Assembly seats were up for grabs.

Congress, Bharatiya Jan Sangh (predecessor of the BJP), Kisan Mazdoor Party, Socialist Party, and Hindu Maha Sabha were the primary parties fighting for control

of Delhi's 48-member assembly. The elections were held on 48 seats with six of the constituencies electing two members and the remaining 36 electing a single member. According to election commission records, the city had 521,766 eligible voters, of which 58.52% exercised their franchise. The Congress won with a majority of 39 seats. The Bharatiya Jan Sangh, Hindu Mahasabha and Socialist Party together bagged 10 seats.

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru appointed Brahm Prakash, a 34-year-old Yadav farmer and president of the Delhi Pradesh Congress Committee, as Delhi's first Chief Minister, overlooking the assertions made by Congress veteran and Chandni Chowk MLA Dr Yudhvir

by a margin of almost 3,600 votes. During the 2020 Delhi Assembly elections, Atishi secured victory over BJP's Dharambir Singh, achieving a margin of 11,393 votes.

On the other hand, I was confident that the BJP would win, but AAP won the Kalkaji constituency due to a poor political campaign by the BJP's strongest candidate, Ramesh Bidhuri, and the Congress candidate, Alka Lamba's, insufficient coordination with her party's cadres. Atishi was sworn in as Delhi's chief minister in September 2024, following Arvind

Kejriwal's resignation, making her the youngest person to hold the role at the age of 43.

If Congress's candidate Alka Lamba had put in the same effort as her party colleague Sandeep Dikshit, who diligently campaigned by going door-to-door and engaging with voters to seek their support for the New Delhi Assembly seat, the outcome might have been different.

However, Sandeep Dikshit did not win, but he played a significant role in defeating Aam Aadmi Party president Arvind Kejriwal in the New Delhi Assembly constituency,

where BJP's Parvesh Verma won by more than 4,000 votes.

On the other hand, another top Aam Aadmi Party leader, Manish Sisodia, who was also defeated by the BJP's strong candidate Tarvinder Singh Marwah in the Jangpura Assembly and was previously a member of the Congress party but switched to the BJP from Congress in 2022. He served in the Delhi Assembly three times: in 1998, 2003, and 2008. Tarvinder Singh Marwah of the BJP is a well-known figure in Jangpura politics.

However, I would like to

Singh. Prakash was sworn in as Chief Minister on March 17, 1952.

Brahm Prakash's time as Chief Minister was characterised by conflicts with the Congress high command. He called for increased autonomy for the Delhi government—a request similar to that made by AAP leader and former Chief Minister of Delhi Arvind Kejriwal. Brahm Prakash's unwavering position ultimately resulted in his dismissal. Brahm Prakash held the position of Chief Minister from March 17, 1952, until February 12, 1955.

Following the dismissal of Brahm Prakash from the position of Chief Minister, Gurmukh Nihal Singh assumed office, serving from February 13, 1955, until October 31, 1956. As a dedicated opponent of alcohol, he fought against the establishment of liquor stores in Delhi and subsequently became the inaugural Governor of Rajasthan. Nihal Singh, born in 1895 in Rawalpindi, later taught at Shri Ram College before embarking on a political career.

Meanwhile, the Delhi State Legislative Assembly was established on March 7, 1952, under the Government of Part-C States Act of 1951. Following the State Reorganisation Commission's recommendations in 1955, Delhi ceased to be a Part-C State on November 1, 1956, and the Legislative Assembly was abolished, transforming Delhi into a Union Territory administered directly by the President.

Upon the adoption of the Constitution on January 26, 1950, Delhi was designated as a centrally administered Part-C state. It was one of seven states—the others being Bhopal, Ajmer, Coorg, Bilaspur, Himachal Pradesh, and Vindhya Pradesh—that had a legislative Assembly,

albeit its powers were limited.

In response to demands for a democratic setup and on the basis of the recommendations of the Administrative Reforms Commission, the Delhi Administration Act of 1966 was enacted, providing for a unicameral deliberative body—the Metropolitan Council—with powers of recommendation in matters of governance, and an Executive Council consisting of one Chief Executive Councillor, three Executive Councillors, 56 elected members, and five other members nominated by the President.

Before the Delhi Assembly was established in 1993, the Capital had a Metropolitan Council with the authority to make recommendations but not legislate from 1966 onwards.

Following the period of the interim council from 1966 to 1967, which was chaired by late Congress leader Jag Parvesh Chandra, who served as the Chief Executive Councillor of Delhi from 1983 to 1990, it is important to note that the role of the Chief Executive Councillor was equivalent to that of a Chief Minister.

And the first Metropolitan Council, spanning from 1967 to 1972, was dominated by a majority government of the Bharatiya Jana Sangh, under the leadership of chairman Lal Krishna Advani, who later emerged as a prominent figure in the BJP and served as Deputy Prime Minister. The Jana Sangh subsequently joined governments in various other Indian states.

From 1956 to 1990, Delhi was governed by a 61-member metropolitan council, led by the lieutenant governor (LG). The council previously provided recommendations on issues of public significance, while the LG held the authority to make the final decisions.

acknowledge the efforts of Congress party leader Farhad Suri, a seasoned politician, who played a crucial role in defeating Aam Aadmi Party's Manish Sisodia, as he received more votes (7,350) than his party colleagues Sandeep Dikshit and Alka Lamba.

Farhad Suri is the son of former Delhi Pradesh Congress Committee (DPCC) leader Tajdar Babar. Suri has previously held the positions of Delhi mayor and opposition leader in the South Delhi Municipal Corporation (SDMC).

And this is referred to as ground political strategies by both parties,

the BJP and the Congress, as both Arvind Kejriwal and Manish Sisodia lost their assembly seats as a result of BJP and Congress.

But believe me, Manish Sisodia, who had switched from the Patparganj constituency to the Jangpura constituency, would have lost the Patparganj assembly seat as well if he had contested from there. Since BJP's Ravinder Singh Negi, who won the Patparganj assembly seat, was more nearly a hundred steps ahead of any other candidates competing from Patparganj in terms of political campaigning.

As far as I know, Ravinder Singh Negi began his political campaign months ago. He was expected to win, and he did, because during his political campaign, he went door to door seeking votes from voters for the 2025 Assembly elections, and voters blessed him and sent him to Delhi Assembly House.

Manish Sisodia won the Patparganj assembly seat three times—in 2013, 2015, and 2020—but was shifted to the Jangpura seat due to his razor-thin victory margin over the Patparganj seat in the 2020 election. However, the party was able to save itself

What Leaders Said After Delhi Election Results

Celebrating the BJP's success in the Delhi Assembly elections, Prime Minister Narendra Modi stated that the country needs a serious political transformation and not politics of "dhoort-ta (deceit) and moorkhta (foolishness)". He said the people of Delhi have "short-circuited the politics of short-cuts" and asserted that the mandate has made it clear that there's no space for corruption and lies in politics.

In a no-holds-barred attack on AAP, Modi said these 'AAP-da' people came into politics saying that they will change politics but they emerged as "kattar baimaan (most dishonest)".

Addressing party workers and supporters at the BJP headquarters here on February 8 evening, Modi said the people of Delhi have shown the door to 'AAP-da' and now a double-engine government will ensure development at a double speed.

He said Delhiites are celebrating BJP's victory and respite from 'AAP-da', a term he used throughout the campaign to criticise the Aam Aadmi Party's rule.

"People of Delhi today have enthusiasm and satisfaction. There is relief of liberating Delhi from 'AAP-da'. I thank all Delhiites for entrusting their faith in 'Modi ki guarantee'," the prime minister said in his address from BJP headquarters.

"Now Delhi's double-engine government will ensure development at double speed. It is a historic win and not a usual victory as the people of Delhi have shown the door to 'AAP-da'. Delhi has become Aapda-mukt," Modi said.

Training his guns on the Congress, Modi said people have again given a big message to the opposition party and it has secured a "double hat-trick" in the national capital by failing to open account in six elections.

"These people are giving themselves the gold medal

in defeat. The truth is that the country is not willing to trust the Congress. I had said the last time that the Congress has become a parasitic party. It drowns and takes down its allies with it," he said.

Modi claimed that the Congress is finishing off its allies one by one and its manner is also very interesting as it steals the issues and language of its coalition partners to dent their vote bank. "In Uttar Pradesh, it is trying to take away the vote bank that SP and BSP consider their own. Similarly, it uses the language of DMK to try and take away its vote bank in Tamil Nadu.

"In Bihar, by spreading the poison of casteism, it wants to eat up the patent ground of the RJD. The Congress has deployed similar tactics in J-K and Bengal. It is clear that those who join hands with the Congress, their destruction is inevitable," Modi said. In his address, he also said that it is for the first time since independence that the BJP is ruling all the states of the NCR.

Attacking the Congress, Modi said,

"After 2014, they tried to become Hindu by visiting temples, wearing maalas. They thought that they would be able to dent the BJP's vote bank. You would have seen that they have now stopped that as they realised that it is BJP's domain." "So, now they have their eyes on these regional parties, to feed off them. The people of INDI alliance have started to realise that the Congress is trying to take back the vote bank these parties had won," he said.

Modi said that the Congress is not as it used to be post-independence as it is indulging in the "politics of urban naxals".

"Congress leaders when they talk of fighting the Indian State, it is the language of naxals. They want

to bring anarchy in the country," he said in a swipe at Congress leader Rahul Gandhi's recent remarks in which he had said - "we are now fighting the BJP, the RSS and the Indian State itself". "AAP-da is also promoting that urban naxal-thinking," Modi said, hitting out at AAP.

The country needs a serious political transformation, 'viksit Bharat' needs new energy, 21st century politics needs new ideas, he said urging the youth to enter politics. "The country does not need politics of 'dhoorta and moorkhta," he said. Modi said the people of Delhi have made it clear that they are the real owners of Delhi and have rejected those who treated it as their property.

In his remarks at the party's headquarters, Modi said Delhi's mandate has made it clear that there's no space for corruption and lies in politics. "Delhi voters never disappointed me in the Lok Sabha elections. In all three general elections, the BJP won all seven seats," he said.

In the meantime, the BJP's second most influential leader after Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Union Home Minister Amit Shah, expressed gratitude to the people of Delhi following the Bharatiya Janata Party's victory in the assembly elections.

"Delhiites have shown that the public cannot be misled by repeated false promises. The public has responded to the dirty Yamuna, dirty drinking water, broken roads, overflowing sewers and liquor shops open in every street with their votes. I heartily congratulate all the workers of @BJP4Delhi who worked day and night for this grand victory in Delhi, BJP National President Mr. @JPNaddaji and State President Mr. @Virend_Sachdeva ji," Shah posted on X.

"Be it the respect for women, the self-respect

of unauthorized colony residents or the immense possibilities of self-employment, Delhi will now become an ideal capital under the leadership of Modiji," Shah added.

"The rule of lies has ended in Delhi... This is the defeat of arrogance and anarchy. This is a victory of 'Modi ki Guarantee' and the faith of Delhiites in Modiji's vision of development. Heartfelt gratitude to the people of Delhi for this massive mandate. Under the leadership of Modiji, BJP is determined to fulfill all its promises and make Delhi the number 1 capital of the world," Shah added

On the other side, Congress leader Rahul Gandhi said the party accepts the mandate with humility. He thanked Congress workers and voters and said the Opposition party would continue to fight for the national capital's progress and its residents' rights.

"We accept Delhi's public mandate with humility. I thank all Congress workers for their dedication and all voters for their support. Pollution, price rise and corruption -- the fight for Delhi's progress and Delhiites' rights will continue," he said in a post on X.

However, in his first statement after losing the New Delhi seat and his party's poor performance in the 2025 Delhi assembly elections, AAP supremo Arvind Kejriwal congratulated the BJP on its victory and said, "I wish that the hope with which the people of Delhi have voted for the BJP, the party will fulfil it."

He went on to say that his party has always worked for the welfare of the city and will play an important new role in the Opposition. "We will play role of constructive opposition but will also be available to people of Delhi," Kejriwal stated.

from further embracement when another top leader, Atishi, narrowly defeated the BJP's Ramesh Bidhuri in the Kalkaji constituency, as projected.

Restoration of an elected assembly

With the people having no direct role in city governance, the demand for the return of an elected assembly was often made. The demands prompted the Union government to establish the Sarkaria Committee (later renamed the Balakrishnan Committee) in December 1987. Two years later,

the committee's report advised that "Delhi should continue to be a Union territory but be provided with a legislative assembly with powers to deal with matters of concern to the common man." Matters related to public order, police and land were to be kept away from the powers of the assembly.

To address the needs of Delhi citizens, the Government of India introduced the Constitution (72nd) Amendment Bill to implement these proposals. While laying out the bill's objectives, Union Home Minister Mufti Mohammad Sayeed stated, "There has been general demand by the public of

Delhi that they should be given effective voice in running their own administration and in order to satisfy the democratic and political aspirations of the people Delhi should be accordedat present, according to some, there is lack of accountability of the administration to the people."

The Constitution (72nd Amendment) Bill was launched in 1991, under the leadership of Prime Minister P.V. Narasimha Rao. The bill passed in 1992. Subsequently, Delhi received an elected legislative assembly as per The Constitution (69th Amendment) Act of 1991. The Act

granted special status to the Union territory of Delhi, establishing a 70-member legislative assembly

and a seven-member council of ministers.

In 1992, the Centre formed a

delimitation commission to carve out 70 assembly seats in Delhi, opening the way for assembly elections. Finally, Delhi restored to democracy in November 1993, when the city held assembly elections. While the BJP, led by Khurana, won by a large margin, PK Dave was appointed as the LG.

Only three women were elected to the House out of 70 members: Krishna Tirath from Baljit Nagar, Tajdar Babar from Minto Road (both Congress), and Purnima Sethi from Kalkaji (BJP).

Since the establishment of Delhi's inaugural legislative Assembly in 1952, the national capital has experienced only eight Assemblies and Chief Ministers. For a span of 37 years, from 1956 to 1993, Delhi's Assembly was abolished, and the region was designated as a Union Territory. The national capital, however, has a colourful political past, with the Congress, Bharatiya Janata Party, and Aam Aadmi Party reigning at various periods in time.

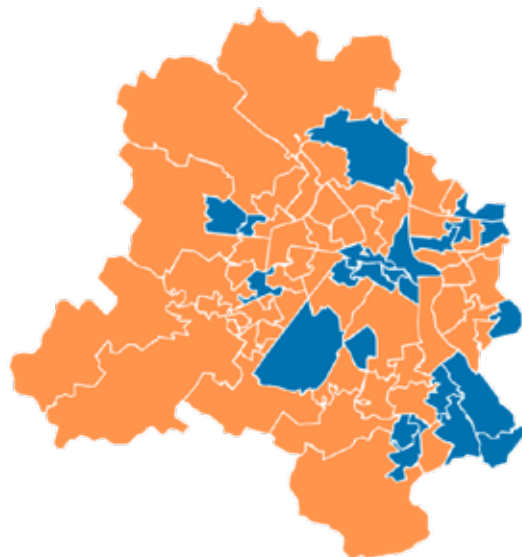
