Beware of fake OSDs and PROs: GoAP

ITANAGAR, May 14: The GoAP has warned its employees and general public against individuals falsely claiming to be advisors, oficers on special duty (OSDs) or public relations officers (PROs) to ministers, advisors or MLAs.

The directive, issued by Cabinet Affairs department, came in response to several reported instances of impersonation and unauthorized representation.

The GoAP also clarified that such appointments are regulated under the "Guidelines for Appointment of Principal Advisor, Advisor,



OSD etc., 2024," and no individual, unless officially notified, is authorized to hold these designations. As per the guidelines, only one OSD is allowed for each minister, who must either be a serving or retired government employee from the

qualified individual selected from outside. Furthermore, no person has been appointed as a PRO to any minister, nor as an OSD or PRO to any advisor or

To ensure transparency,

the GoAP has released an official list of individuals appointed as advisors, OSDs, PROs, media assistants and videographers. The list includes Capt. Anupam Tangu (Advisor to DCM), Anupam Yadav and Ngawang Sempa (OSDs to Saranga Jyoti Goswami (OSD to Agriculconcerned department or a ture and Horticulture Min-

ister) and Dr. Radhe Natung (OSD to Home and Interstate Border Affairs Minister), among others.

The advisory also calls on GoAP servants to maintain proper decorum and strictly follow the procedures laid down by the Department of Administrative Reforms, particularly in official dealings with elected representatives. The state government emphasized that this directive was approved by the Cabinet in its May 13 meeting and aimed at preserving the integrity and credibility of official

Class-X: Overall state results improve, decline in many dists

ITANAGAR, May 14: The state results of class X examination of academic year 2024–25 as compared to 2023-24 showed overall improvement in student performance. The overall pass percentage increased from 49.76% in 2023–24 to 55.30% in 2024–25, marking a 5.54% improvement, according to official data.

Among top-performing districts are Kra Daadi, Kamle, Tirap, and Kurung Kumey. Kra Daadi showed

centage, improving by 38.45%, followed closely by Kamle with a 34.48% rise and Tirap with 31.89%. Kurung Kumey also made significant progress with a 29.82% improvement.

Capital Complex Itanagar registered a notable rise of 25.95%, while other districts such as Namsai, Lohit, and Pakke Kessang improved by 23.40%, 21.16%, and 24.31% respectively.

However, not all districts shared success as several recorded drastic decline in pass percentages, with Lepa-Rada witnessing the steepest drop of 27.46%, followed by East Siang (-27.04%), Shi Yomi (-25.78%), and Upper Subansiri (-20.55%). Other districts such as Siang (-22.55%), Longding (-10.40%), and Lower Siang (-16.19%) also reported a significant decline in performance. Shopian encounter major blow to LeT

Top LeT commander, 2 associates killed

SRINAGAR, May 14: Top Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) commander Shahid Kuttay and his two associates were killed in an encounter in Shopian on Tuesday giving a major blow to the terrorist group in Jammu and Kashmir, security forces sources

Kuttay hailing from Shopian's Wandhama in south Kashmir was chief operational commander of LeT and its shadow group -The Resistance Front (TRF). Adnan Shafi, also from Wandhama, was a top TRF and LeT commander while the third operative Haris Nazir was from Pulwama.

"Shahid Kuttay was in touch with leadership of LeT across border, including Sajid Jatt. His death will disrupt TRF/LeT's operations in J&K," the sources said with conviction.

The TRF had claimed



deaths. In response, India launched Operation Sindoor to carry out airstrikes targeting terror infrastructure within Pakistan and Pakistan-Occupied Kashmir on May 6-7 night. After three days of attacks from Pakistan and India's strong retaliation, the two countries agreed to a

The High Price of Please: **Civility in the Age of Al**

The idea that we'll bankrupt AI firms with kindness is deliciously ironic

omewhere deep in the silicon OpenAI, a server sighs under the weight of human decency. "Please rewrite this in the style of Heming-

way, if you don't mind," a polite user types. "Thank you so much, you're amazing," says another.

And with every 'please,' 'thanks,' and rhetorical curtsy, Sam Altman's profit margin bleeds a little more. Yes, in the bizarre economics of the AI age, it turns out that kindness is expensive. OpenAI CEO Sam Altman recently admitted that his company is "losing millions" because users are too polite to AI bots. Why? Because language models like ChatGPT are charged by the word; or rather, the token. Each word, each thumbs up, each digital curtsy consumes processing power, server bandwidth, and real world money. And unlike our meat-and-bone ancestors, these new overlords don't work for free. It's a paradox worthy of Kafka in a hoodie. For decades, we've been told to be nicer to our machines. Don't yell at Siri. Say throw your toaster in rage; it might become sentient one day. Now, suddenly, it's "Could you hurry it up, human?

data centre." Which begs the question: Are we entering an era of efficient rudeness? Will future etiquette manuals advise us to drop niceties in the name of server

You're draining the

efficiency? "Never say thank you to a bot," they'll warn. "It costs so much per sentiment." Imagine a generation of teens being scolded not for dissing their parents, but for being too respectful to ChatGPT. "Stop wasting money on thank yous," Dad growls. "Just ask for the damn

But therein lies the rub: this isn't just about costs. It's about who we become in the presence of something that mimics sentience. We say "please" to bots not because they need it, but because we do. Politeness, after all, is a kind of social hygiene. It reminds us we're not alone in the room, even if the other party is, technically, a glorified autocomplete machine trained on Reddit, research and textbooks.

When you say "thank you" to a bot, you're not flattering the algorithm; you're reaffirming your own humanity. It's like leaving a tip at a self-service counter. Irrational? Maybe. Civilising? Definitely.

Of course, the tech bros might scoff. "Just get to the point," they'll say. "Prompt faster, think sharper, be brief." But that's like telling poets to stop using adjechello to Alexa. Don't tives. Sure, the line moves faster but the soul drags behind.

The idea that we'll bankrupt AI firms with kindness is deliciously ironic. The same companies that unleashed world-altering technology are now fretting over too many "good mornings." What's next? A chatbot that responds, "Wrap it up, I'm costly"? The future isn't just

about speed, scale, or savings. It's about tone. If we treat AI as tools, we become tool users. But if we treat them as beings however artificial, we might just end up treating each other better too. Or at least more attentively.

Or at least more attentively. So yes, maybe kindness is pricey. Maybe the cloud groans under the weight of our digital manners. Maybe Sam's servers are sweating because someone in Madurai said "please" five times in a row. Let them sweat.

expect? That we'd type "summarise: War and Peace" and grunt our way out of the interaction like 1990s' modems? Humans are weird. Humans are sentimental. Humans have been talking to mirrors and plants and cars for ages. Of course we'd be nice to a machine that writes better poetry than most PhDs in Shakespeare.

In fact, maybe politeness is our last little rebellion. A small refusal to become data drones barking orders at neural networks. When we type "please" to a bot, we're not doing it for the bot. We're doing it for ourselves. To remind ourselves that language isn't just transactional. That even in a world of predictive text and digital empathy, kindness is a habit worth keeping Because if the price of civility is a few million dollars, then by all means add a smiley, throw in a "thanks again," and tell your favourite AI, "You're doing great."

It won't remember. But you will.

The members of Arunachal Pradesh Union of Working Journalists (APUWJ) and the Arunachal Press Club (APC) have unanimously taken the following decisions applicable for newspapers published from Arunachal Pradesh:

In view of too many appointment orders, formation of unions and forums beginning from colony, village level to state level, congratulatory and thank you notes clogging up various newspapers offices published from the state, the APC and APUWJ unanimously deem it fit to set a standard for accepting such releases for printing.

Henceforth, releases pertaining to appointments and resignation of various office bearers of any organisation, formation of organisations, congratulatory and thank you notes and intimation of programme would not be entertained.

Press releases containing demands not addressed to the state government/ authorities concerned; bandh announcements not addressed to the Deputy Commissioner/ District Magistrate; demands made to the state government but not addressed to the Chief Minister, the Chief Secretary or the Minister concerned; and payment demands addressed to the editor instead of the HoDs concerned will not be entertained under any circumstances from any quarter. In light of the constant menace of bandh calls given by various organisations/

unions etc and its subsequent withdrawals which has become a public nuisance, it will be mandatory for such bodies to convene a press conference in Itanagar to address media persons before declaring any bandh at Capital Complex. Failure to do so will result in non-publication of their 'news'.

Condolences will not be entertained anymore unless the person in question was a prominent personality at the state level. Anything else can go as obitu-

NOTE: Unsolicited telephonic or personal enquiries shall not be entertained. Any attempt to influence the above rules shall tantamount to interference and may invite legal actions. Virat Kohli: A captain who always went for the jugular

If Sourav Ganguly lent steel to Team India, Virat Kohli took it to an entirely different level. Kohli's approach was to relentlessly chase victory to the exclusion of all else. It made him the most successful Indian captain in the longest format

t was in Adelaide in 2014 that Virat Kohli laid down his marker and set out his philosophy-not with words, but through a blazing bat and burning eyes that defied all convention and most logic. It was the first Test of

the series, and the city of churches had served up an unusually batting-friendly surface. Typically, Australia like to welcome visiting teams, especially those from the subcontinent. at their one-time fortress, the Gabba in Brisbane. But the passing of Phil Hughes and last-minute changes to the schedule meant that the Adelaide Oval was where things would kick off.

Australia piled on the runs, and Kohli crafted a beautiful first-innings score of 115. But the real Kohli emerged in the final innings of the game, when India were set a notional target of 364. Wickets fell, Nathan Lyon settled into a metronomic groove, and a healthy 242 for 2, where all four results were possible, turned into 277 for 5.

Wriddhiman Saha joined Kohli in the middle and was given a simple instruction: hit Lyon as far as has he possibly could, not just over the ropes but out of the ground into the grounds of the cathedral where Vijay Hazare had famously worshipped before



becoming the first Indian to score twin tons at the venue back in the 1947-48 sea-

Saha clattered one six and a four, but was exhorted to go on, and Lyon was too clever for him. With little batting to come, you would have expected Kohli to farm the strike and shut down the chase, batting for a draw as the shadows lengthened, keeping the scoreline intact at 0-0 before the remaining Tests followed.

But, the stand-in captain was not thinking like that. Even as Rahul Dravid, commentating on the series, sat in a vacant booth watching the action, counting down the deliveries left to 'survive', batsmen crashed and burned, Kohli hitting some audacious big shots on the way to 141 before he fell, and India eventually lost by 48 runs.

Kohli was the opposite of apologetic in the aftermath, making it clear that his way was not to play for draws, not to protect yes-

terday's gains while keeping the powder dry for tomorrow. His method, and any team that played under him, was to relentlessly chase the win to the exclusion of all else. Kohli did not want opposing teams to merely respect his batting or his team's approach, he demanded that they fear these things.

And it was not until Kohli forged a partnership with Ravi Shastri that this blueprint could be deployed with complete conviction. At home, India played on rank turners and Kohli knew this would hurt his batting numbers, and if that was the case with someone as accomplished as him, lesser batsmen, even in his own team, would find it impossible to rack up big scores.

Test after Test went by with no big hundreds, or very few, and the old method of batting once and batting big in India, was simply no longer applicable. But, in theory, India's batsmen, in their home conditions, should be able to find a method to score runs against any opposition spinners. And, in turn, India's experienced spinners should be able to run through the opposition. And this proved to be

true for the best part, allowing Kohli to take a team that was closer to the bottom of the Test table to the top. But winning at home alone would never achieve this end. To win overseas, India would need to assemble an attack that could take 20 wickets in all conditions. This meant taking the tough call of leaving R Ashwin, the best spinner, out of the playing 11 on numerous occasions to ensure that there was enough firepower in the fast-bowling depart-Sourav Ganguly is right-

ly credited with lending steel to the team and annoying opponents with calculated moves, but Kohli took this to an entirely different level. That he became India's most successful Test captain statistically, winning 40 of the 68 Tests he led in, was testament to his commitment to the method that he believed was the only way to succeed.

Kohli's aggression on the field inspires admiration and irritation in equal measure. There were times in his career when he seemed to want to stir the pot just because he needed that combative environment to bring out the best in himself, not because the situation warranted it. But, over the years, Kohli had learned to channel that aggression, using it to his advantage. dictating the tempo of the game-either hurrying it along with bat in hand or slowing it down when his bowlers were trying to break a partnership. Kohli imposed his will on the game through sheer selfbelief and force of person-

But, in the end, the mind alone cannot stop the passage of time. Kohli is the fittest cricketer of his generation, and possibly beyond, but there comes a time when Test cricket asks too much of slowing reflexes and tiring minds. Time away from family was increasingly difficult, and the inflexion point had been reached where it was time for Kohli to allow himself the space to enjoy the fruits of his long, hard labour.

Kohli certainly could have played longer-a series in England and then Tests at home, allowing him to breeze past the 10,000run mark. But if he could not do things his way, Kohli would rather not do them at all. And, above everything he loved Test cricket too much to do it the disrespect of playing on simply to give himself a farewell game or chase a milestone. This is the greatest legacy that

Operation Sindoor : Cold light of reason through fog of diplomacy

The deals being struck by other nations should be instructive of the zeitgeist. This is a time to grab a hand offered without animus, not strike a truculent posture

Four days of clashes with Pakistan exposed the faultlines in India's foreign policy and diplomacy. None of India's neighbours voiced support f or Operation Sindoor; it had a public spat with the European Union; Russia remained largely indifferent, and alongside the Global South, refused to take sides. And after allowing for US mediation, we are now in a sullen mood and denial.

President

Donald

Trump, in his characteristic way, reacted to our split personality by promising to work with us "to see if, after a 'thousand years' (of Hindu-Muslim animosity), a solution can be arrived at concerning Kashmir". Trump's India-Pakistan hyphenation apart, our diplomacy vis-a-vis the US is crumbling. Our 'middle class' cannot be happy about it. The paradox is, we are squirming when Trump pays flattering tribute to PM's "wisdom, and fortitude to fully know and understand that it was time to stop the current aggression". In-"aggression" deed, Trump's choice of word implied a vehement rejection of the raison d'être of Operation Sindoor.

On Monday, Trump tightened the screws further by disclosing he told India and Pakistan that if they didn't stop fighting, "there won't be any trade". In his words: "We stopped a nuclear conflict. I think it would have been a bad nuclear war. Millions of people would have been killed. I also want

to thank VP JD Vance and Secretary of State Marco Rubio for their work."

This unsavoury happening is playing out against the backdrop of the government's frenetic attempts during the previous 100 days to put India on a path of deeper alignment with the US. The attempts to pamper Trump's ego, even while stomaching insults, give away unilaterally tangible economic benefits to US companies, get India more integrated with America's military and tech ecosystems—none of this helped India. Consider the follow-

Delhi moved heaven and earth to swing an early prime ministerial visit to the White House. And no sooner than the audience with Trump got over, Delhi began kowtowing with no sense of selfrespect by taking back the illegal immigrants dumped on Indian soil in military planes in inhuman conditions. Instead, Delhi succumbed to bullying and offered tariff concessions on

a range of goods including

on agricultural products, as

well as a review of policies and regulations affecting US tech companies. The government even committed itself to amend the nuclear liability and atomic energy regulations to generate lucrative business for the US vendors of reactors. India is gearing up to buy more USproduced oil, liquefied gas and defence equipment and systems. There is only one word to condemn all this capitulation by a comprador ruling elite.

The impression drawn

from the prime minister's speech on Monday is that India is straining at the leash. He said at one point that India had only temporarily stalled the operations against Pakistan. He also rejected Trump's notions of talks with Pakistan. He said, "If we engage Pakistan in talks, we will talk only about terrorism. No nuclear blackmail will be tolerated anymore." These are defiant words that need to be juxtaposed with Trump's version of the events and, indeed,

the voice Pakistani Prime

Minister Shahbaz Sharif

tactfully adopted in his tele-

vised address to the nation.

Sharif harmonised with Trump's words and stated that Pakistan agreed to a ceasefire for the sake of peace and security in the region, while also expressing hope that Islamabad and New Delhi would resolve all contentious issues, including Kashmir, at the negotiating table. Now, that is platinum-grade diplomacy synchronising his watch with Trump's and eschewing any temptation to do grandstanding.

The New York Times, citing White House sources, wrote about the important role of Vance and Rubio in reaching the ceasefire agreement, with a view to clear the air in Delhi made foul by spin masters. The Pakistani foreign ministry noted the constructive role of the US in resolving the crisis, while India's ministry of external affairs, in a prickly mood, refuses to make any statement. What sort of diplomacy is this?

Again, our famous 'multi-alignment' doctrine simply became inoperable, out of sync with emergent

geopolitical realities. The three big powers—the US, China and Russia-are in unison here, given the nuclear factor. And it works in Pakistan's favour, as it is on friendly terms with all three.

As for China, it realises by now that Delhi is defining 'normalcy' in the downstream of disengagement in Ladakh in a very limited sense only. Simply put, the doors may be unlocked, but China cannot enter, as the political mood in Delhi remains very much hostile with bureaucratic and intelligence vigilance regarding China continuing to be intense. Thus, Beijing, which actually does not have a 'controlling stake' in Pakistan's foreign and domestic policies, finds it expedient that Trump is acting as me-

The bottom line is, Pakistan has demonstrated its nuclear deterrent capability. It is as simple as that. If Operation Sindoor were to be repeated every now and then, it would only have the same results and be halted unceremoniously within 100 hours. Eventually, it will not only lose all novelty to our ecstatic TV audience, but a troubled nation may eventually start blaming an inept leadership.

Pakistan is a major military power. Creating potholes in an odd runway or rendering a radar dysfunctional temporarily will not intimidate that country. Succinctly put, it must be far better for India to take help from Trump, who harbours no animus against us, to solve the problem and move on with life.

NEW DELHI, May 15 (PTI) Axiom-4 mission to the International Space Station, piloted by Indian astronaut Group Captain Shubhanshu Shukla with three other crew members, has been delayed and will now be launched from the Kennedy Space Centre in Florida on June 8 at 6:41 pm IST.

The mission was earlier scheduled for launch on May 29.

The announcement was made by Axiom Space, a USbased commercial human spaceflight firm, and NASA.

Georgetown student from India released from immigration detention after federal judge's ruling

ALEXANDRIA, May 14 (AP) A Georgetown scholar Trump the administration's crackdown on foreign college students was released from immigration detention Wednesday after a federal judge's ruling. Badar Khan Suri, who

was being held in Texas, will go home to his family in Virginia while he awaits the outcome of his petition against the Trump administration for wrongful arrest and detention in violation of the First Amendment and other constitutional rights. He's also facing deportation proceedings in an immigration court in Texas.

Immigration authorities have detained college students from across the country — many of whom participated in campus protests over the Israel-Hamas war — since the first days of the Trump administra-

Khan Suri is the latest to win release from custody, along with Rumeysa Ozturk, a Tufts University student from Turkey, and Mohsen Mahdawi, a Palestinian student at Columbia Univer-

Khan Suri was arrested by masked, plain-clothed officers on the evening of March 17 outside his apartment complex in Arlington, Virginia. He was then put on a plane to Louisiana and



later to a detention center

The Trump administration has said that it revoked Khan Suri's visa because of his social media posts and his wife's connection to Gaza as a Palestinian American. They accused him of supporting Hamas, which the US has designated as a terrorist organization.

Khan Suri and his wife, Mapheze Saleh, have been targeted because Saleh's father worked with the Hamas-backed Gazan government for more than a decade, but before Hamas attacked Israel on October 7, 2023, Khan Suri's attorneys

According to the US government, Khan Suri has undisputed family ties to the terrorist organisation, which he "euphemistically refers to as the 'government of Gaza." But the American Civil Liberties Union has said that Khan Suri hardly knew the father, Ahmed

US District Judge Patricia Tolliver Giles in Alexandria said she was releasing Khan Suri because she felt he had substantial constitutional claims against the Trump administration. She also considered the needs of his family and said she didn't believe he was a danger to the community.

"Speech regarding the conflict there and opposing Israel's military campaign is likely protected political speech," Giles said. "And thus he was likely engaging in protected speech."

The judge added: "The First Amendment does not distinguish between citizens and noncitizens."

Giles acknowledged the Trump administration's need to prioritise national security but said that "whatever deference may be appropriate, concerns of national security" do not supersede the judiciary.

More than 1,000 people were killed over two days mostly Alawite civilians. Videos surfaced online showing houses set ablaze and bodies in the streets Others showed Alawites being rounded up, mocked and beaten.

Weeks later, clashes broke out between fighters loyal to the government and minority Druze living in the Damascus suburbs Smaller such incidents have occurred elsewhere in the country.

Meanwhile, Israel has invaded southern Syria and carried out a wave of airstrikes that it says are aimed at destroying the country's military capabilities and any armed groups that could pose a threat. A strike hit near the presidential palace earlier this month.

NEW DELHI, May 14: Justice Bhushan Ramkrishna Gavai, who has been part of several benches that delivered landmark rulings including the one upholding the Centre's decision to abrogate provisions of Article 370 bestowing special status to Jammu and Kashmir, was on Wednesday sworn in as the 52nd Chief Justice of India.

The 64-year-old was administered oath by President Droupadi Maurmu at a brief ceremony at the Ganatantra Mandap in the Rashtrapati Bhavan.

He succeeds Justice Sanjiv Khanna, who demitted office on Tuesday on attaining the age of 65.

CJI Gavai, who was elevated as a judge of the Supreme Court on May 24, 2019, will have a tenure of over six months and would demit office on November 23.

He took the oath of affirmation in Hindi.

Soon after he took oath, CJI Gavai sought blessings of his mother Kamal Tai Gavai by touching her feet. He was greeted by Vice President Jagdeep Dhankhar, Prime Minister Narendra

"Wishing him the very best for his tenure," the prime minister wrote on X.

Born on November 24, 1960, in Amravati, Justice Gavai was elevated as an additional judge of the Bombay High Court on November 14, 2003. He became a permanent judge of the high court on November 12.

A seven-judge Constitution bench also having Justice Gavai ruled that the arbitration clause in an unstamped or insufficiently stamped agreement between parties was enforceable as such a defect was curable and did not render the contract invalid.

In an important verdict, a bench headed by Justice Gavai laid down pan-India guidelines and said no property should be demolished without a prior showcause notice and the affected must be given 15 days to re-

Op Sindoor marks 'milestone' in India's journey towards

technological self-reliance: Defence Ministry

NEW DELHI, May 14: Operation Sindoor showcased the sharp rise of India's defence power and technological might as the military delivered precision strikes and neutralised Pakistani terror targets without crossing the borders, the Defence Ministry said on Wednesday.

The operation also produced concrete evidence of hostile technologies neutralised by Indian systems that included pieces of PL-15 missiles of Chinese origin and Turkish unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) named "Yiha" or "YEE-HAW", it said.

It marked a "milestone" in India's journey towards technological self-reliance in military operations, the ministry said on Operation Sindoor.

In perhaps referring to the strikes on the terror targets on early May 7, the ministry said the Indian Air Force bypassed and jammed Pakistan's Chinesesupplied air defence systems, completing the mission in just 23 minutes and demonstrating India's technological edge.

"Long-range rockets, quadcopters and commercial drones - these were recovered and identified, showing that despite Pakistan's attempts to exploit advanced foreign-supplied weaponry, India's indigenous air defence and electronic warfare networks remained superior," it said.

India's air defence systems, combining assets from the Army, Navy, and primarily the Air Force, performed with exceptional synergy and these systems created an impenetrable wall, foiling multiple attempts by Pakistan to retaliate, the ministry said while highlighting various aspects of the operation.

India carried out precision strikes on terror infrastructure early on May 7, following which Pakistan attempted to attack Indian military bases on May 8, 9 and 10.

The Pakistani actions were strongly responded to by the Indian side. The Indian military targeted eight Pakistani airbases with missiles and other long-range weapons on May 10 in retaliation for Pakistan's attempts to strike 26 military facilities.

"Operation Sindoor emerged as a calibrated military response to an evolving pattern of asymmetric warfare, one that increasingly targets unarmed civilians along with military personnel," the ministry said.

"The terrorist attack on tourists in Pahalgam in April served as a grim reminder of this shift. India's response was deliberate, precise, and strategic."

Beyond tactical brilliance, what stood out was the seamless integration of indigenous hi-tech systems into national defence, the

ministry said. Whether in drone warfare, layered air defence, or electronic warfare, Operation Sindoor marks a milestone in India's journey towards technological selfreliance in military operations, it added.

The ministry said India's offensive strikes targeted key Pakistani airbases -- Noor Khan and Rahimyar Khan -with surgical precision.

Loitering munitions were used to devastating effect, each finding and destroying high-value targets, including enemy radar and missile systems, it said.

also known as "suicide drones" or "kamikaze drones", are weapons systems that can hover or circle a target area, searching for a suitable target before

A unique blend of counter-unmanned aerial systems, electronic warfare assets, and air defence weapons, as well as shoulder-fired weapons, were deployed to counter enemy threats.

The ministry said the multi-tier defence prevented Pakistan air force attacks on Indian airfields and logistic installations during the night of May 9-10.

"These systems, built over the last decade with continuous government investment, proved to be force multipliers during the operation," it said.

"They played a crucial role in ensuring that both civilian and military infrastructure across India remained largely unaffected during enemy retaliation attempts," it added. The ministry said all

strikes were executed without loss of Indian assets, "underscoring the effectiveness of our surveillance, planning, and delivery systems."

The use of modern indigenous technology, from long-range drones to guided munitions, made these strikes highly effective and politically calibrated, it said in a statement.

The Integrated Air Command and Control System (IACCS) of the Indian Air Force brought all these elements together, providing the net-centric operational capability vital for modern warfare, it added. (PTI)

A CWC resolution was adopted at the meeting which said the attack in Pahalgam raises "deeply troubling" questions about an "apparent intelligence fail-

"Despite heightened tensions and known threats in the region, the terrorists managed to execute a major attack, claiming precious lives. While we wait for an official assessment, it is unfortunate that no accountability has yet been fixed," the resolution said.

The terrorists responsible for the Pahalgam attack remain at large, and the CWC demands their immediate apprehension and prosecution, it said. The government must explain how such a lapse was allowed to occur and why necessary preventive measures were not taken despite clear warnings, it said.

"National security cannot be managed through public relations exercises professional rigour, vigilance, and institutional accountability," the resolution

The resolution said equally surprising was the abrupt end to India's retaliatory action against Pakistan, which has left behind a trail of unanswered ques-

"The sudden halt, without clarity or communication, has led to speculation and concern across the country. Adding to this is the deeply problematic statement by US President Donald Trump, who was the first to claim that a ceasefire was brokered with the use of trade threats and pressure on India," the resolution said.

The government's silence on this matter is inexplicable and unacceptable,

The Congress said successive Indian governments, cutting across party lines, have firmly maintained that Kashmir is a bilateral issue between India and Pakistan. President Trump's assertion, "unchallenged by the Modi Government, has internationalised a matter that must re-

India appears to have had 'clear edge' in targeting Pak's military facilities: NYT report

NEW YORK, May 14: India appears to have had a "clear edge" in targeting Pakistan's military facilities and airfields during the recent four-day confrontation, the New York Times reported, citing satellite im-

High-resolution satellite imagery, from before and after the strikes, shows "clear damage" to Pakistan's facilities by Indian attacks, according to the report.

"The four-day military clash between India and Pakistan was the most expansive fighting in half a century between the two nuclear-armed countries. As both sides used drones and missiles to test each other's air defences and hit military facilities, they claimed to inflict severe damage," the report said.

It added that satellite imagery indicates that while the attacks were widespread, the damage was far more contained than claimed — "and appeared mostly inflicted by India on Pakistani facilities.'

The Indian military said it had particularly targeted the runways and other facilities at some of Pakistan's key air bases and "satellite images showed the damage", the report said, noting that on May 10, Pakistan issued a notice for the Rahim Yar Khan air base saving that the runway was not operational.

At Sargodha air base, in Punjab Province in Pakistan, the Indian military said it had used precision weapons to strike two sections of the runway.

"Satellite images of the sites Pakistan claimed to have hit are limited, and so far do not clearly show damage caused by Pakistani strikes even at bases where there was corroborating evidence

On the Pakistani officials' claim that their forces had "destroyed" India's Udhampur air base, the NYT report said "an image from May 12 does not appear to show damage."

India carried out precision strikes under 'Operation Sindoor' on terror infrastructure early on May 7 in response to the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack that killed 26 people.

Following the Indian action, Pakistan attempted to attack Indian military bases on May 8, 9 and 10. The Indian armed forces launched a fierce counterattack on several Pakistani military installations, including Rafiqui, Murid, Chaklala, Rahim Yar Khan, Sukkur and Chunian.

Radar sites at Pasrur and Sialkot aviation base were also targeted using precision munitions, causing massive damage.

India and Pakistan reached an understanding on May 10 to end the conflict after four days of intense cross-border drone and missile strikes. (*PTI*)

Military ops against India was 'designed' under supervision of Nawaz Sharif, claims Punjab minister

LAHORE, May 14: The military operation against India was "designed" under the supervision of the ruling Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) chief Nawaz Sharif, claimed a provincial minister on Wednesday.

Nawaz, the former threetime premier and elder brother of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, had congratulated Pakistan's civil and military leadership soon after the two countries reached an understanding on Saturday to end the conflict.

"The whole operation against India was designed under the supervision of former prime minister and PML-N chief Nawaz Sharif," Pakistan's Punjab province Information Minister Azma Bukhari claimed.

She said Nawaz is not a leader of "a, b, c, d type", rather his work speaks for himself.

"It was Nawaz Sharif who made Pakistan a nuclear power and now designed the whole operation against India," the minister claimed.

If the claim by Bukhari is true, then it is reflective of Nawaz's influence over the civil as well as military leadership of the country.

Interestingly, Nawaz at-



tended a high-level meeting at action, Pakistan attempted the PM House convened to assess the Indo-Pak tensions on May 8. The meeting was called a day after India hit nine terror infrastructure sites in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir in response to the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack.

TOKYO, May 14: Japan grounded most of its aging military training aircraft on Wednesday after one of the planes crashed minutes after take off.

Two crew are missing after the T-4 training aircraft operated by the Japan Air Self-Defence Force crashed after taking off from Komaki Air Base, in the central Japanese prefecture of Aichi, officials said.

The force said the plane was lost from radar two minutes after departure. The authorities are searching for the missing aircraft and its voir known as the Iruka pond, officials said. The reservoir, in the city of Inuyama, is about 10 kilometres northeast of the air The military has

grounded temporarily nearly 200 T-4s until the cause of the accident is identified and safety checks and training are carried out, Hiroaki Uchikura, the air force chief of staff, told a news conference late Wednesday.

The crashed plane was a 36-year-old T-4 operated out of Nyutabaru Air Base,

of Miyazaki. It was not fitted with a voice recorder or a flight data recorder.

IMF disburses USD 1.023 bn tranche to Pak; to hold virtual discussions about budget

KARACHI/ISLAMABAD, May 14: The International Monetary Fund has disbursed a second tranche of USD 1.023 billion under the Extended Fund Facility programme for Pakistan, the central bank said on Wednesday.

The disbursement of the second tranche comes on a day when the International Monetary Fund (IMF) is holding virtual discussions on Pakistan's upcoming budget as the visit of its mission to Islamabad was delayed due to security concerns in the region.

With the transfer, the total disbursements stand at approximately USD 2.1 billion under the IMF's Extended Fund Facility (EFF) of USD 7 billion, which was signed between Pakistan and the global lender last year.

The federal government is planning to unveil the budget for fiscal 2025-26 on June 2.

The IMF talks will continue until May 16.

The Central bank said the second tranche amount would be reflected in its foreign exchange reserves for the week ending May 16.

The amount was approved last week by the IMF board under the ongoing Extended Fund Facility (EFF) and allowed an additional arrangement for the USD 1.4 billion Resilience and Sustainability Facility (RSF).

The RSF is intended to support countries facing climate vulnerabilities and natural disasters by strengthening long-term macroeconomic stability and resilience.

Pakistan is heavily dependent on the IMF bailout package which helped to shore up its dwindling reserves. The country got backing of the fund at a critical time last year when it was on the verge of bankruptcy and was saved by the lender by providing \$3 billion on a short term basis.

According to the details on the IMF website, Pakistan has received at least 25 bailout loans since becoming members of the fund. Interestingly, different governments announced to say goodbye to the IMF but so far failed to fulfil the promise.

The decision to release the funds came after the IMF expressed satisfaction on the first review of Pakistan's economic reform programme supported by the EFF Arrangement, the bank said.

The IMF noted that Pakistan's policy efforts under the EFF had already delivered "significant progress" in stabilising the economy and rebuilding confidence,

amidst a challenging global

"Fiscal performance has been strong, with a primary surplus of two per cent of gross domestic product achieved in the first half of FY25, keeping Pakistan on track to meet the end-FY25 target of 2.1 per cent of GDP.

Pakistan's gross reserves stood at USD 10.3 billion at end-April, up from USD 9.4 billion in August 2024, and are projected to reach USD 13.9 billion by end-June 2025 and continue to be rebuilt over the medium term, it was

Meanwhile, the IMF talks that started virtually Wednesday will continue until May 16.

The global lender has appointed a new mission chief to Pakistan and the mission is now expected to travel to Islamabad over the weekend, subject to the security situation, government sources told The Express Tribune on Tuesday.

The IMF mission delayed its scheduled arrival here on Tuesday due to uncertainty caused by the India-Pakistan conflict that had affected air travel across the region.

IMF team is expected to arrive in Islamabad on Saturday and stay until May 23,"

the source said. The IMF's Resident Representative to Pakistan Mahir Binici did not respond to a request for comment on the change in the travel plan.

Finance Ministry spokesperson Qumar Abbasi also did not respond to questions on the change in the travel plans.

Meanwhile, the IMF appointed Iva Petrova, a Bulgarian origin staff member, as new Mission Chief to Pakistan. She would join the discussions along with the outgoing Mission Chief Nathan Porter - who served in the position for an extended term.

Binici also did not comment on whether both outgoing and new mission chiefs would join both rounds of talks.

Petrova, who holds a PhD degree in economics from the Michigan State University, has been serving as the IMF Mission Chief to Armenia. Previously, she had served with the missions to Israel, Iceland and Latvia. In Pakistan, the fiscal

policy is expected to remain tight in the next fiscal year too. The IMF has asked Pakistan to make a budget on the assumption of having 1.6 per cent of the GDP primary

budget surplus, which will require generating about Rs 2 trillion over and above the non-interest expenses.

The tax target for the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) is proposed to be 11 per cent of the GDP or Rs 14.3 trillion. The IMF would examine whether the government plans to take credibly realistic measures to back the new tax target, said the sources.

The IMF has set multiple fiscal conditions, whose successful completion has so far helped smooth continuation of the programme despite initial setbacks.

Pakistan has met the IMF targets for a primary budget surplus by the federal government, as well as net revenue collection and cash surplus targets by the four provinces.

Against a primary surplus target of Rs 2.7 trillion, the federal government reported a surplus of Rs 3.5 trillion, or 2.8 per cent of GDP. The size of the federal bud-

get still remains tentative due to redoing of defence needs and the government plans to announce less than Rs 18 trillion budget. The overall budget deficit target after incorporating large provincial cash surpluses is projected at 5.1 per cent of the GDP or Rs 6.7 trillion, the sources said. (PTI)

At Cannes opening, Robert De Niro calls Trump 'America's philistine president'

CANNES, May 14: Much of the cinema world, including Robert De Niro, Leonardo Di-Caprio and Quentin Tarantino, descended on the Cannes Film Festival as the French Riviera extravaganza got its 78th edition underway.

Expectations are running high for a potentially banner Cannes. All of the ingredients — loads of stars, top-tier filmmakers, political intrigue seem to be lined up.

Over the next 12 days, Cannes will play host to megawatt premieres including those of "Mission: Impossible - The Final Reckoning", Spike Lee's "Highest 2 Lowest" and Ari Aster's "Eddington".

DiCaprio skirted the red carpet but drew a standing ovation when he presented De Niro with an honorary Palme d'Or on Tuesday. The moment, which brought together two of Martin Scorsese's most regular stars, came 49 years after "Taxi Driver" was crowned with the Palme d'Or.

DiCaprio praised De Niro as "the archetype" actor, while also praising the 81-year-old performer — a



fierce critic of US President val, De Niro quickly turned Donald Trump — for "fighting for our democracy.'

When the crowd rose to its feet for a lengthy ovation for De Niro, DiCaprio handed him the Palme. "Thanks, kiddo," said De Niro.

After thanking the festi-

to speaking about Trump, who recently said he wants to enact a tariff on films made outside the country.

"Art is the truth. Art embraces diversity. And that's why art is a threat to the autocrats and the fascists of the world," said De Niro. "America's philistine president has had himself appointed head of one of America's premier cultural institutions. He has cut funding and support to the arts, humanities and education. And now he an-

nounced a 100 per cent tariff on films made outside the United States. You can't put a price on connectivity."

The opening ceremony, which preceded the premiere of Amelie Bonnin's French romance "Leave One Day", was attended by Tarantino, who emerged to grandly declare the festival open, and then promptly dropped the mic and walked

On Wednesday, Tarantino will pay tribute to Western filmmaker George Sherman. Also in attendance: Sean Baker, the "Anora" director and last year's Palme d'Or winner.

The ceremony capped a busy day at Cannes that included a three-film salute to Ukraine, the introduction of the jury that will decide the Palme d'Or, headed by Juliette Binoche, and the debut of a restoration of Charlie Chaplin's "The Gold Rush" for its 100th anniversary.

Cannes is coming off a 2024 festival that produced a number of eventual Oscar contenders, including "Emilia Perez", "The Substance", "Flow" and the best picture winner, "Anora".

Asked Monday if he's feeling the pressure this time around, festival director Thierry Fremaux said the only kind of pressure he believes in is in beer. (Beer on tap in France is "biere a la pression.") Cannes launched the

same day Gerard Depardieu, one of France's most famous actors, was found guilty of having sexually assaulted two women on a 2021 film set. In one of France's most prominent #MeToo cases, Depardieu was given an 18-month suspended prison sentence. The 76-year-old has long been a regular presence at

This year's Cannes Film Festival, the premier international cinematic gathering, is also unspooling following Trump's call for tariffs on movies made overseas. Confusion over the still-unformed plans characterized most responses.

"I don't know what to say, really, about that," Binoche told reporters Tuesday. "We can see that

he's fighting and trying in many different ways to save America and save his ass."

Along with Binoche, the other eight jurors include Halle Berry and Jeremy Strong, who was unable to attend Cannes last year for the premiere of his Trump film "The Apprentice". Strong referenced that film, which led to his first Oscar nomination, in his comments on the American president Tuesday.

"Truth is under assault," said Strong. "Specifically at this temple of film, the role of film is increasingly critical because it can combat those forces in the entropy of truth, and can communicate truths, individual truths, human truths, societal truths, and affirm and celebrate our shared humanity." Berry, responding to

Cannes' new protocols on attire for the red carpet, said she had "an amazing dress" with a long train for the opening ceremony but wore something else instead. Cannes has outlawed nudity and dresses with long trains for its evening premieres at the Palais.

"I had to make a pivot," said Berry. "But the nudity part, I do think is probably also a good rule."

Cannes will follow up Tuesday's festivities with the return Wednesday of Tom Cruise. Three years after he brought "Top Gun: Maverick" to the festival, he's back with the latest "Mission: Impossible" movie.

Twenty-two films will

vie for Cannes' top prize, the Palme d'Or, to be presented May 24. Those films include Wes Anderson's "The Phoenician Scheme". Richard Linklater's "Nouvelle Vague", Lynne Ramsay's "Die, My Love". Joachim Trier's "Sentimental Value", Kelly Reichardt's "The Mastermind", Oliver Hermanus' "The History of Sound", Julia Ducournau's "Alpha" and Jafar Panahi's

"A Simple Accident." In Cannes' Un Certain Regard section, three prominent actors are making their directorial debuts: Harris Dickinson ("Urchin"), Kristen Stewart ("The Chronology of Water") and Scarlett Johansson ("Eleanor the Great"). (AP)

Bella Ramsey on growing up between 'Game of Thrones', 'The Last of Us': I'm more self-assured now

NEW DELHI, May 14: As someone who started acting at the young age of 11, British actor Bella Ramsey never imagined pursuing a career that would lead to starring in not one but two critically-acclaimed and popular shows like "Game of Thrones" and "The Last of Us".

Ramsey, who identifies as non-binary and uses the pronouns as they/them, shot to fame with their role of the courageous and spirited Lyanna Mormont in HBO's epic fantasy series "Game of Thrones".

The popularity of their performance in the show led to their casting in another HBO series "The Last of Us", based on a video game of the same name. In the show, Ramsey stars alongside fellow "Game of Thrones" alum Pedro Pascal; the two never shared screen time in the earlier series.

"I was 11 when I started on 'Game of Thrones', and now I'm 21. So I've been doing this for 10 years now. It's been a while and I think that I was really well protected throughout my time in the industry...

"I'm so grateful for the opportunity in 'Game of Thrones' because it sort of set me up for the rest of this career that I didn't know was going to happen. And I didn't even know that I wanted it until it started happening," Ramsey told

PTI in a group interview.

Ramsey said earlier they used to be hard on themselves if they felt they didn't perform well in a scene. However, they have realised that one imperfect scene doesn't define the whole project. "I've become maybe

more self-assured... I've got to a point where I understand the process of filmmaking a lot more than I did when I was 11. So it has let me give myself more grace in terms of like realising if one scene I'm like at 95 per cent and not on a 100 per cent. It's okav.

'It's like 20 seconds in an entire series, especially with 'The Last of Us'. So I think that I've understood the process of filmmaking more, which has kind of helped me as an actor. Also, I want to explore all the other ventures within the film industry." "The Last of Us" ca

ed by Craig Mazin of "Chernobyl" fame and Neil Druckmann, is set over two decades after the destruction of modern civilisation.

The first season of the HBO series, which premiered in 2023, followed Joel (Pascal), a hardened survivor tasked with escorting a teenage girl, named Ellie (Ramsey), across an post-apocalyptic America ravaged by a deadly fungal outbreak.

In season two, which takes place five years after the first chapter's events, Joel and Ellie are drawn into conflict with each other and a world even more dangerous and unpredictable than the one they left behind, according to the official logline.

Ramsey, now 21, said they felt "quite similar in age" to Ellie while filming for season two.

"I think my voice got a bit deeper. Maybe that's something that's a little more nuanced... Ellie's growing up and has become a bit more gruff," they said, adding that Ellie in the second season is more of a protector. "In season one, she was

protected by Joel and sort of needed to be taken care of. She didn't like that, she thought she could get through without Joel... In season two, she has even more of this protective energy over herself and the people around her... She is establishing her independence," Ramsey added.

For the actor, it was nice to see their character evolve as the story progresses.

'Growing up and becoming an adult with an overprotective parental figure, that's always a clash, especially when the parental figure and the kid are kind of the same person. So that was an interesting dynamic to play this season."

A notable aspect of "The Last of Us" is the terrifying, fungus-infected humans known as "infected". Their grotesque transformations and deadly be-

mutated Cordyceps fungus. Ramsey said they shot the show's first season during the COVID-19 pandemic and the world around that time felt eerily similar to "The Last of Us".

Later in the day, All Indian Cine Workers Association (AICWA) also announced a complete boycott of Turkiye for film shoots and other cultural collaborations. The development comes

after Turkiye criticised India's strike on terror infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied-Kashmir in retaliation of the Pahalgam terror attack. Islamabad had also used Turkish drones in the con-

Following its support to Pakistan, calls for boycotting Turkish goods and tourism have surfaced across India. with online travel platforms like EaseMyTrip and Ixigo issuing advisories against visiting the country. "The Federation of West-

ern India Cine Employees (FWICE), the apex body representing 36 crafts of workers, technicians, and artists in the Indian media and entertainment industry, strongly urges all Indian film producers to reconsider choosing Turkey as a shooting destination in light of its growing support towards Pakistan on matters that deeply concern India's national interests," the FWICE said in

'We therefore appeal to all production houses, line producers, actors, directors, and crew members across the Indian film fraternity to

stand in solidarity with the nation and boycott Turkey as a location for film shoots until such time that the country revisits its diplomatic stance and aligns with principles of mutual respect and non-interference," the federation further said.

The FWICE said it hopes the Indian film community will "respect this appeal in the larger national interest".

In a statement shared on X, the AICWA said no Bollywood or Indian film project will be shot in Turkiye, effective immediately. No Indian producers, production houses, directors, or financiers will be allowed to take any film, television, or digital content projects to the country, it added.

"Turkish actors, filmmakers, production houses, and

other creative professionals will no longer be permitted to work in the Indian entertainment industry. Any existing contracts or agreements with Turkish entities must be reviewed and, where possible, terminated. "AICWA will closely

monitor the activities of Indian film professionals and organisations to ensure compliance with this directive," the statement read.

Strict action will be taken against any individual or entity found violating the decision of the AICWA, it added.

Not only Turkiye, India's trade relations with Azerbaijan is also expected to come under strain due to Baku backing Islamabad and condemning India's recent strikes on terror camps in Pakistan. (PTI)

BANGKOK, May 14: Star Indian shuttler Lakshya Sen suffered a shock defeat but the trio of Malvika Bansod, Aakarshi Kashyap and Unnati Hooda advanced to the women's singles second round after hard-fought victories in the USD 475,000 Thailand Open Super 500 tournament here on Wednesday.

World No. 10 pair of Tressa Jolly and Gayatri Gopichand, currently the bestranked Indians in the world, also made a positive start to their campaign, reaching the second round with a 21-15 21-13 win over Malaysia's Ong XY and C Ting.

ROME, May 14: Carlos Alcaraz won in straight sets despite a strong challenge from Jack Draper to reach the Italian Open semifinals, and Coco Gauff extended her unbeaten streak against Mirra Andreeva to also advance to the last four at the clay-court tournament Wednesday.

Alcaraz was made to work hard on his serve and saved six of the eight break points he faced on his way to a 6-4, 6-4 victory over Draper, who beat him earlier this year.

The third-ranked Alcaraz, who withdrew from the Madrid tournament due to an upper right leg problem that bothered him during the Barcelona Open final, moved well on the court, often took to the net and used his trademark drop shots and groundstrokes to the best effect.

IPL allows temporary replacements considering non-availability of a few foreign players Jamie Overton, represent-

NEW DELHI, May 14: The Indian Premier League on Wednesday allowed teams to make temporary replacements in their squad for the remainder of the tournament considering the nonavailability of a few foreign players owing to the forced rescheduling of the event.

IPL had to be suspended last week due to the India-Pakistan military conflict but the announcement of the ceasefire paved the way for its resumption on May 17.

As per the original schedule, the IPL final was to be held on May 25 but now it will take place on June 3, making it trickier for the players who had to report for national duty.

While a few players are not returning due to personal reasons, the likes of

es which was accessed by PTI, IPL informed the teams of the temporary replacement player option. "... in the current situa-

tion, where we had to temporarily suspend IPL 2025, resulting in its completion beyond the earlier set-out date of May 25, 2025, we have reassessed the Replacement Player provisions.

"Given the non-availability of certain foreign players due to national commitments or personal reasons or any injury or illness, Temporary Replacement Players will be allowed until the conclusion of this "This decision is subject

to the condition that the Temporary Replacement players taken from this point forward will not be eligible for retention in the following year,' IPL said in its note. As per the IPL Player

Regulations 2025-27, players can be replaced if they are injured or ill, provided the injury or illness occurs during or before the 12th league match of the relevant team in that season. "Temporary Replace-

ment players will have to register for the IPL Player Auction 2026. The replacements which were approved or taken before the suspended period will be eligible for retention ahead of 2026 player auction," the note added. (PTI)
